We are pleased to be able to report upon another rewarding and successful fiscal year at the Gibson House. We welcomed ever-increasing numbers of visitors who took our tours and attended our programs, which included lectures on Gilded-Age fashion and painter John Singer Sargent's female subjects, Pride Month celebrations, a Holiday Open House, and our Annual Benefit and Repeal Day party. To our great delight, we received a two-year Mass Humanities Staffing Recovery Grant that will allow us to create new opportunities for visitation and engagement. Keep an eye open for more on upcoming events!

Moreover, through the generosity of private donors and grants, we have been able to pursue important restoration projects, such as repairing degraded windows on the Museum's upper floors and damaged plaster in the ground-floor service spaces. Such undertakings will ensure that the museum remains preserved, protected, and inviting for years to come.

Our late president, Ruth Ann Kupfer, who unexpectedly passed away in January, was

gratified by these developments. A longtime board member, Ruth was always interested in ways the Museum might remain both sustainable and vibrant. To this end, *we have set up a fund in Ruth's name* that will help support future Museum operations and projects. ## Treasurer's Report, FY 2022-2023

Revenue was a little less and expenses a little more than budgeted. Expenses were \$135,441 against a budget of \$133,679. Sources were \$123,948 against a budget of \$131,943. The deficit was close to the amount of budgeted draw from the general endowment that was not taken this year (about \$11,000). Net deficit was \$11,493.

Rental income was an important factor in this year's budget. Revenue was 183% of budget. Also significant were non-board donations to the Annual Benefit (151% of budget). Rental income is difficult to plan for, as are Benefit donations, but this year they represented significant income that mitigated other areas where revenue was not as good as planned (for example, board-member donations to the Benefit were 45% of budgeted amount).

Again this year there were significant donations to the Hammond Family Curator Fund, and not drawing the budgeted amount from the general endowment increased the balances

held in endowments and mitigated investment losses due to market volatility. At the end of the year, net holdings in the endowment accounts were up about 14%.

## Curator's Report, FY 2022-2023

This year was a busy and productive one. Thanks to the generosity of a private donor, we were able to hire a conservator from the Williamstown Art and Conservation Center to survey our collection of approximately 75 prints. Based on this assessment, we sent one of our more valuable works, an 18th-century mezzotint of General Joseph Warren (hero of the Battle of Bunker Hill and a Gibson-family relative) to Studio TKM conservators for treatment. (This print is now on loan to Historic New England for their *Importance of Being Furnished* exhibition.) We also hired Colleene Fesko, a Boston-based fine arts and antiques appraiser, to conduct an appraisal of our paintings collection; the previous appraisal was over thirty years old. With additional support from another group of donors, we conducted a full inventory and assessment of our costume collection (over 80 garments), which has resulted in improved catalog records and housing, and plans for increased interpretation.

The Gibson House Museum is a private, nonprofit house museum in Boston's historic Back Bay neighborhood. The home served as residence to three generations of Gibson family members and their household staff between 1859 and 1954. The museum's four floors of period rooms, including the original kitchen, are a time capsule of domestic life in the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. Visitors experience the house through guided tours that interpret class and culture through the stories and objects of the people who lived and worked there.
